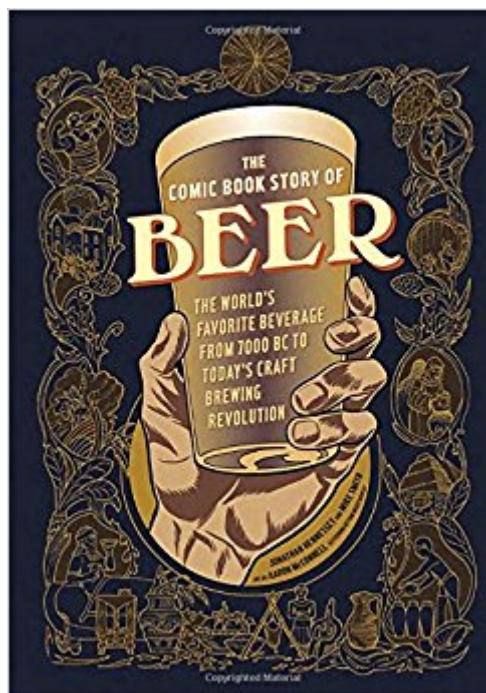

The Comic Book Story of Beer is a fascinating read for home-brewers, beer enthusiasts, or anyone interested in learning about where beer comes from and how it became what it is today. While it verges on the edge of over-emphasizing the importance of beer to history, it is a fun read and the artists do a great job supplementing the story. The Comic Book Story of Beer starts all the way in the ancient world, when the first evidence of beer exists in 7000 B.C., and follows the development of beer from then to the modern day. The book talks about both the social and the technical evolution of beer throughout its history. As someone who has homebrewed and is working in the brewing industry, I have never considered the social evolution of beer and its importance to historic societies. Beer is definitely present in many ancient myths and rituals, it was seen as a form of food or nourishment in medieval times, and it was even common practice for everyone to brew their own beers in their homes throughout these times, but it is important to define beer before deciding if these ancient forms can be considered equivalents of what we currently consider beer. Beer has evolved greatly; the original forms were just bread put into a jar to ferment. One of the first laws created regarding food was about beer, and this set the precedent for the beer we are accustomed to today. Reinheitsgebot, created in 1447 in Munich, Germany, was meant to protect the purity of beer. The law stated that beer could only be made with three ingredients: hops, water, and barley. At this point in time, brewers did not realize that yeast was involved in the creation of beer, and even when it was discovered it was not known to be alive until 1837. Charles Cagniard de la Tour, Friedrich Kützing, and Theodor Schwann found yeast to be living organisms which led to Louis Pasteur to think of new ways of preserving beer. Pasteur found that if you temporarily heated brewed beer to kill leftover microorganisms, the beer would last longer. This helped prolong the

shelf life of beer. Before pasteurization, consumers had refrigerated beer in ice caves if the climate allowed, or were forced to drink their beer quickly as for it not to rot. From here, the evolution of beer took off. Hansen discovered a way to make genetically pure strains of yeast by culturing it in a lab so that brewers could now create their own strains of yeast that was optimized for their own specific needs. Beer has not only revolutionized the culinary industry, but has launched scientific creativity as well. It used to not be considered a high quality drink to pair with foods, but craft beers have taken over the market and beer can now be paired with gourmet or high end foods, something that would have seemed ridiculous 40 years ago. The history of beer is shown in such great detail throughout the book and even the specifics of how to brew it. Overall, it's a great read!

I must say, the graphics in this book were absolutely amazing. I was expecting this book to be more of a cute book; say beer super heroes. But, it is actually quite informative. There was lots of cool information about the history of beer, as well as brewing. But, it is written like a comic book. It is not only a great read, it is a nice book to throw on the table for any visitors looking to pass the time. Again, the graphics were insanely cool. I was blown away.

I had this on my wish list, and I purchased on the recommendation of a friend. It's a fun read. It gives an astounding amount of detail for being a graphic book. Traces the history of beer from ancient civilization to medieval Europe and on to the New World and ends with a decidedly Americentric look at Prohibition and the craft beer rebirth. It's accurate with inline citations. A comprehensive index allows you to use this as a reference book. I recommend it without reservation.
