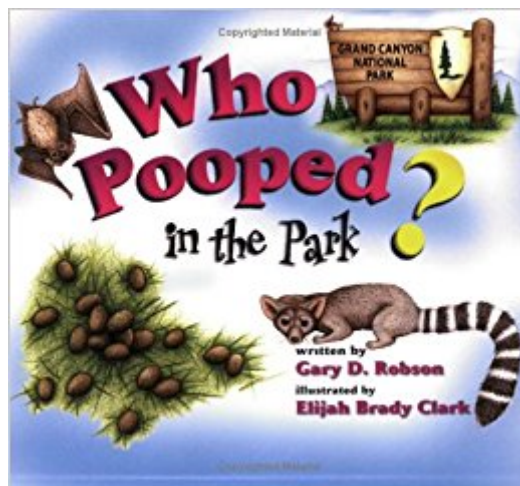




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Who Pooped In The Park? Grand Canyon National Park: Scat And Tracks For Kids
