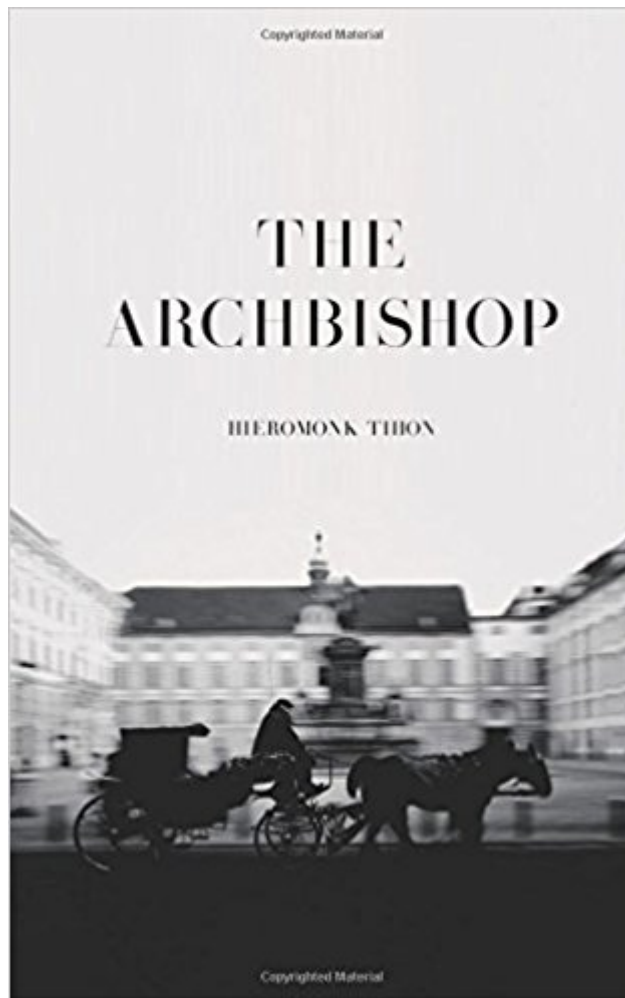

I haven't finished reading "The Archbishop" yet but need to update my original low rating, which was based on that first (rather long) free sample. Since corrections were made I was eager to buy and read it. The story obviously has riches--accessible to me now, with only occasional stumbling blocks to distract this former teacher. When I'm able to finish reading the book, I'll consider upgrading to five stars. (Personal limitations have slowed life for me.) As content of the story becomes more riveting, it overcomes all else. I recommend "The Archbishop" today. Original review: Where to start with the free sample? I couldn't engage with the story while sorting out punctuation errors, particularly errors in dialogue, and even more particularly dialogue within dialogue. Real groaners there. Capitalization errors, typos, and even one strike-over correction were also distractions. Moreover, the word "Holy" was spelled correctly just one time. Seven times it was spelled "Holly." Despite the hurdles, I saw several amateurish problems in the story-telling process. However the interesting premise would have made me somewhat forgiving, inviting me to read on--if only I could have managed to engage with a story that is burdened by so many errors. Unaccountably. one reviewer--of a print copy--praised the writing of "The Archbishop." Could it be that some *expert* line editor's exceedingly hard work just didn't make it to the kindle version? Not worth my buying a print copy to find out.
